HELLO FRIGHTENERSI

WOW! If you would have asked me if I ever thought I'd be writing a column in Haunt Nation a few months ago I probably would have said no but then again if you would have asked me if I ever thought I'd have my own Podcast I would have said your nuts! That fact that I'm here doing both now is amazing but it's not without a lot of help and support.

In this my first column for Haunt Nation let me introduce myself and give you some of my haunter backstory leading up to how Fright Radio came to be and what I hope the future holds for the show.

Most of you may now know me as the Radio Reaper but within the haunt community my handle is Grimlock. Why the name Grimlock you ask? Well my path to being a Halloween fanatic with a name such as grimlock (my favorite Transformer growing up) and home haunter really began in October of 2008.

I had just gotten married and my wife and I were planning to host our first ever Halloween party. Me being the type of person who can't do anything on a small scale thought "how cool would it be to do a small walk through for our guests!" With a few store bought props and some carved tombstones we decorated our entire 3 bedroom apartment and turned it into a haunted mansion. Our friends loved it! Around every corner, nook, and cranny laid a surprise for our unexpecting guests, by the end of the night multiple people told my wife and I we needed to go bigger and one day do something for the public and it was then that my interest and true love for the haunting took flight.

I began researching the industry learning what professional haunts were out there, learning about the industry, vendors and just soaking up everything. I lived, eat and breathed haunting all day everyday.

After more research, an eventual business partner and a relationship with a local non profit emergency squad Grimlock Manor was born! Using my skills in design and marketing I set out with the goal of having 2,000 people come to our haunt in 2009. There were plenty of bumps in the road, long hard work hours but in the end we had

a show that I was proud of and yes, we not only reached but exceed our goal!

Alas, 2009 was Grimlock Manors only full year in production. While we really couldn't have asked for a better turn out the decision was made to turn our attention back to home haunting.

From 2010-2011 we haunted my parents house and turned Grimlock Manor into a large party walk through haunt. During these two years I began to learn more about the entire haunt community and not just the industry. I began to make lots of haunt friends through local make and takes like the NJ/PA Group where I would meet Ghoulish Cop who you all know from his segment on Fright Radio "The Haunt Rant." My skills as a haunter and prop maker grew through these friendships and my thirst for more was still ever growing.

Finally in 2012 I had my own house and while Super Storm Sandy would ultimately cancel my first Halloween there 2013 brought nothing but delight! We had well over 300 visitors, a few local paper write ups and just a great time over all but as I was working on my haunt for 2013 so was I working in Fright Radio.

I had some experience doing segments on other haunt radio shows and while one segment was enough for me to imagine how hard creating a full show would be it wasn't within my nature not to try.

I began by reaching out to various haunter friends gagging their interests and finally recruited the crew you hear today.

-Chris and Jeff Davis of the Davis Graveyard, two wonderful Haunters with amazing knowledge and know how. - Ghoulish Cop, a great friend, prop maker and a guy who isn't afraid to take a deeper look into what makes our industry and community tick. - The Toy Haunter AKA Cory of Columbia Manor. A passionate haunter who not only loves Halloween but collects everything to do with the holiday. - Mike Mellilo AKA Dr Mythsonian. Probably one of the best sculptors I know and prop makers. - Mr. Chicken. A brilliant Special Effects artist and whiz at projection effects. - Miss Mischief, our beautiful bringer of all haunt related news and yes The Radio Reapers wife! - And finally our newcomers The Boneyard Creep & Grim Ghost. Both of these guys have the biggest Halloween Hearts and passion I have ever seen.

Now while Fright Radio is only 4 episodes in I feel great about where we are with the show and the content we are bringing our listeners. We aim to put the fear in your ear each and every month and keep doing our best to break new grounds. For example our partnership with Haunt Nation that landed us right here right now writing to you!

For Fright Radio it's all about giving back and sharing the joy that we have experienced on our long road in this industry and great community. Haunters are the best people I know and I'm proud to be called one. I'm looking forward to what this year will bring for the show and I can't wait to keep working with Haunt Nation to continue to spread the fear! The Radio Reaper~





We at Haunt Nation Magazine are proud to have the winner of last year's Hack A Christmas Prop contest, Paul Hallenbeck from Madison, WI. give us some insight to his killer animated reindeer prop hack. Paul's prop was the overwhleming favorite among the judges.

When I first heard about the Haunt Nation Magazine "Hack a Christmas Prop" contest I was excited to give prop building a try. I had never built a prop before aside from small knick-knacks I had put together for Halloween Parties in the past.

Recently I had been following a lot of haunter guides & tutorials and I had read some posts about people hacking motorized Christmas decorations so I was eager to try it for myself. Since I didn't have a lot of knowledge about animatronics or motors this seemed like a good place for me to start.

For my prop build I began with a Christmas reindeer lawn decoration that moved it's head from side to side. I

purchased the Reindeer from a thrift shop and it turned out to be in desperate need of repair before I could start building my prop.

I began my design with a sketch of the reindeer and tried to visualize how pink foam would fit around it in order to change it's shape into that of a werewolf. I decided that changing the look of the neck, back and legs was the most distinct way to make my reindeer closer resemble a beast.

I added the pink foam for the body using Gorilla Glue to attach the foam pieces to the metal frame of the reindeer and then Loctite Foamboard Adhesive for building up more layers of pink foam. I used clamps during this process to hold the different layers in place while the adhesives set.

For the face I used a combination of cardboard and foam in order to sculpt more difficult shapes that I would later build up with paper mache techniques.

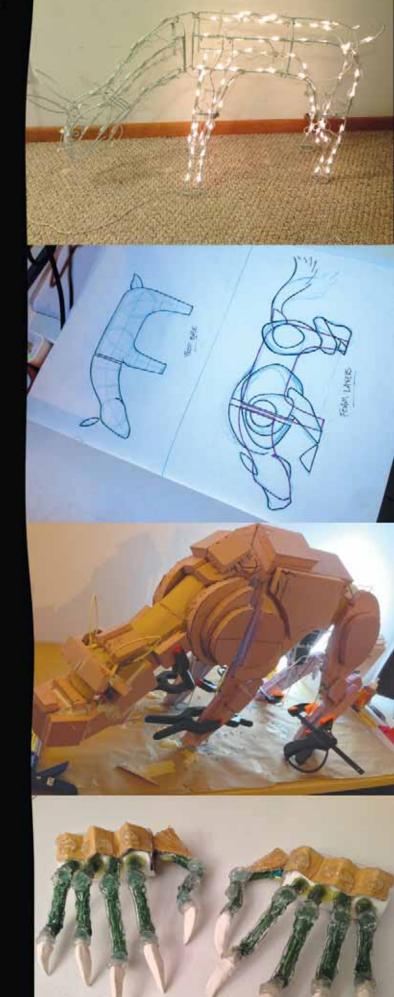
Once the body had taken shape I started to sketch out muscles for the werewolf. I looked online for inspiration and came across pictures of dogs with something called a "myostatin deficiency" which caused the animals to grow insane amounts of muscle. Some of these animals almost resembled werewolves and provided great inspiration for my design.

After sketching the muscles onto the foam with a Sharpie, I heat carved the details into the foam panels. During this process I learned two important things: A hot wire cutter is good for cutting shapes out of flat foam panels and a hot-knife is better suited for sculpting 3D foam props. It also goes without saying that you should only heat carve foam in a well ventilated area.

After the foam was carved, I painted the entire prop with Drylock and then applied newspaper strips dipped in Drylok using a paper mache process. I used additional strips of paper balled up and molded into shape to create details like wrinkles and lips on the face and then covered them in mache strips once they were dry to ensure that they stayed in place.

The eyes were built from recycling LEDs from a previous year's Halloween costume and a Tupperware container was mounted inside the prop to act as a water resistant box for an internal speaker. The teeth and claws are made from a modeling clay called Sculpty which can be baked in a normal oven in order to create small, hard pieces for your props. Sculpty can be fragile depending on it's thickness so I used thick wire inside the teeth and claws to reinforce them.

I wanted to create creepy human looking hands for the prop but ran into an issue with lumber splitting if I cut the pieces too small and then tried to drill into them. In order to get around this I decided to make the palm of the hands from PVC pipe pieces and used green yard stakes





for fingers which I was able to cut with a hacksaw and then bend into shape with pliers.

Once the Drylock and paper mache had hardened over night I painted the prop using a brown exterior latex paint that I poured into several bowls to lighten and darken with black and white exterior paints. This allowed me to paint more depth on the face and body than if I had only used one shade of brown.

To finish the prop I used Stanley extra strength glue sticks with my glue gun to attach fur that I had picked up at Jo-Ann Fabrics. The fur was applied in several layers to add depth and conceal a gap in the neck that allowed for the head movement.

I am very happy with how this prop turned out and if I had to change anything about it I would have researched some building methods that allowed the prop to be lighter since the weight of the head puts a slight strain on the motor. But I have run the prop for hours while testing it and have not had any problems.

I want to thank Haunt Nation Magazine for hosting a really fun and cool contest and say thanks to everyone in the haunt community for sharing their knowledge of prop building. Without it my prop could not have been built. Thank you!

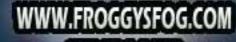

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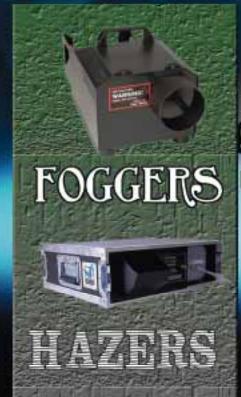
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A CRAWITH THE MAJORASK MAN

Recently I was able to sit down and talk with the sick and twisted mind behind the Mad Mask Man (MMM) and find out how he creates and what inspires some of the most insane designs I have seen in a long time and I am extremely grateful that MMM took some time out of his very busy schedule to talk with me.



When did you get started making masks?

I created my first mask in December 2012, but I didn't start my Face-book page and begin selling them until March 2013. Since then I filled over 140 orders and currently I am on a 2 month back order since all of my masks are made-to-order. I don't keep a stock of them on hand.

What fuels your twisted mask making?

Mainly Black Metal music, mostly Swedish and Norwegian bands.

I heard your masks have made it into a couple of movies?

Yeah, the movies are *Everybody Dies* and *Evil Inbreed* but both are still in production and a few bands have ordered masks and use them on stage, they are: Squirlley Arts (USA), Ermiha (Canada), Bile of Man (South Africa), SGF (USA) and then I did masks for a bunch of guys in bands but they don't wear them on stage: Zornheym of Dark Funeral, Martin Donnelly of Advent Sorrow, Alvaro of Watain, Seregor of Carach Angren.

How long does it usually take to create a mask?

I have five basic designs some one can pick from, when they decide what type of coloring scheme they want it will usually take me around 2 weeks to complete one. Of course if someone wants a complete custom mask and not one of my original five designs it will take longer.



What do you like to do when your not creating a mask?

My wife and I love to paint really sick and twisted dolls. She goes by StichWitchDolls and she is amazing at it. (Haunt Nation will be interviewing her for the March issue.)

Where can someone get one of your masks?

I don't really go to the conventions or have a web site. So, if someone wants to order one all they need to do is go to my facebook page, www. facebook.com/MadMaskMan75 and message me.

Haunter Education is a key component of HAuNTcon



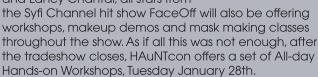

November 1st 2013 12:31 AM.....the gates of hell come to a close after yet another year of terrifying our guests at The Devil's Attic haunted attraction. 2013 marks our 4th season of providing Louisville KY with a truly theatrical experience to live out ones horrific nightmares. Every year as we close our doors its like the day after Christmas for us haunters. We prepare all year for 6 weeks (16 to 17 nights for us) of operation by constructing and designing new scenes and props, developing new costuming, training the actors, and executing a guerilla style marketing plan which all comes to an abrupt end ...then haunt depression sets in.

As for myself I typically crawl into a dark dungeon away from all human contact to rejuvenate my haunt juices. 16 nights of operation may not seem like a lot but the stresses of operating a haunt and making it a success takes its toll on one's health and mental state. It is an entire year of planning, marketing and precise execution. The most difficult part of trying to take my mental break is that the creative juices continue to flow with new scene ideas, new character ideas, more creative scares etc. Probably because it is an obsession and passion of mine...like many of you reading this article. Once the 2 weeks of solitude are up.....it's time to start planning for our new nightmares!

TIME TO CELEBRATE ANOTHER YEAR OF NIGHTMARES.

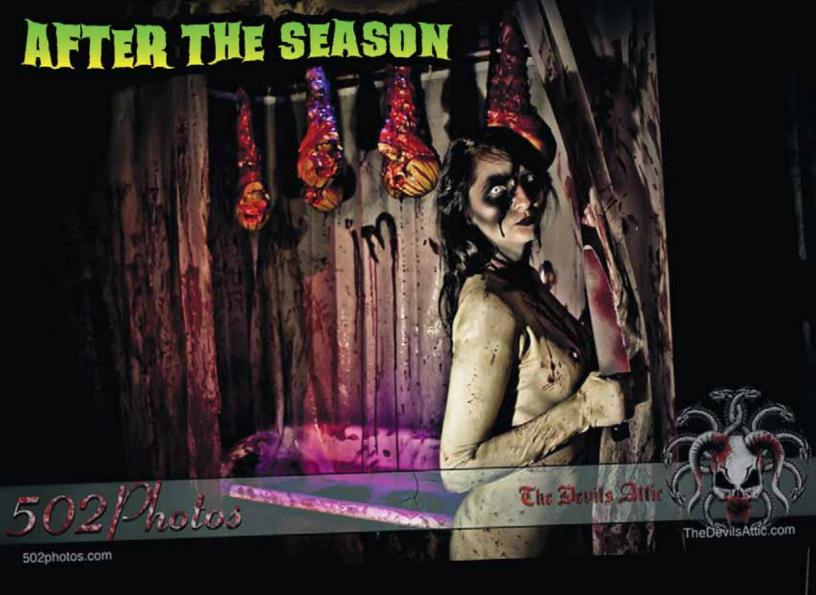
I then have to remind myself to slow down and first celebrate our 2013 season with the haunt crew! This year the haunt crew headed to the local bowling alley where we rented out a party room and several bowling lanes. The evening's festivities included an awards banquet, viewing of the 2013 season highlights reel, food and beverage, dance floor, classic horror flick viewing and bowling. I personally feel that everyone on the crew contributed to help make the haunt successful therefore everyone received an award. I asked my managers to creatively give each of the crew a personalized award which included titles such as: Silent but Deadly Award, Golden Gas Mask Award, The Black Out Award, and the Agent of Chaos Award. We also had a few traditional awards such as the Rookie of the Year Award and the Trooper Award. With 40 plus crew this was quite a task and my management crew did a hell of a job. We also showed a viewing of our 2013 season highlights reel created by my actor manager. Each year he has created a highlight reel which includes hilarious skits (usually went on during haunt hours), creative editing, and a killer soundtrack. This year's movie was called: One for You 3: The Shocker. The One for You title is derived from a nightly tradition at the haunt where The Devil gives every monster a personal "One for You" salute before we open. It was an awesome trip down memory lane with some very surprising content and laughs all the way through. Always a hit to our post season celebrations!

THE WHEELS BEGIN TO TURN FOR NEXT YEAR

Now that the celebration has come to a close and the haunt juices rejuvenated....the next task in line is to start putting all of the new ideas on paper. When designing scenes I look at them like a piece of artworkwhere the monsters are the key elements that bring them to life! I try to imagine every piece of detail down to the lighting, wall texture, props, costuming and most importantly the scares. Many of these ideas I discuss with the crew to get feedback and room for improvement. Budgets are then set for each new idea and the hunting begins for props, costuming and construction materials. So far we have 4 new scenes that will be a "work in progress" as they always tend to develop once the wheels start turning. Additionally we will be rearranging and adding a few hallways to change things up. As for operational changes we make adjustments every year. Most are due to an increase in volume of our guests and how we time our tours, security related challenges and just the general flow of the show. My philosophy on the haunt is that it is always evolving and there are always room for ideas and improvements.... always a work in progress.

As for the winter months (Nov.-Feb.) I generally work on new props, costuming etc. at my home as the haunt (as do most old warehouses) does not have heat or a/c. Typically once the weather breaks, usually right after Transworld (late March), construction begins. I usually like to keep my construction team very small (one to two people plus myself). Usually my managers are an integral part to construction, costuming and prop detail. I do this for many reasons as I am very meticulous on detail and am very hands on with each scene. Once or twice a season I usually will hold a "blood" day where I will open up the invite for the whole DA crew to come bloody up props, walls etc.





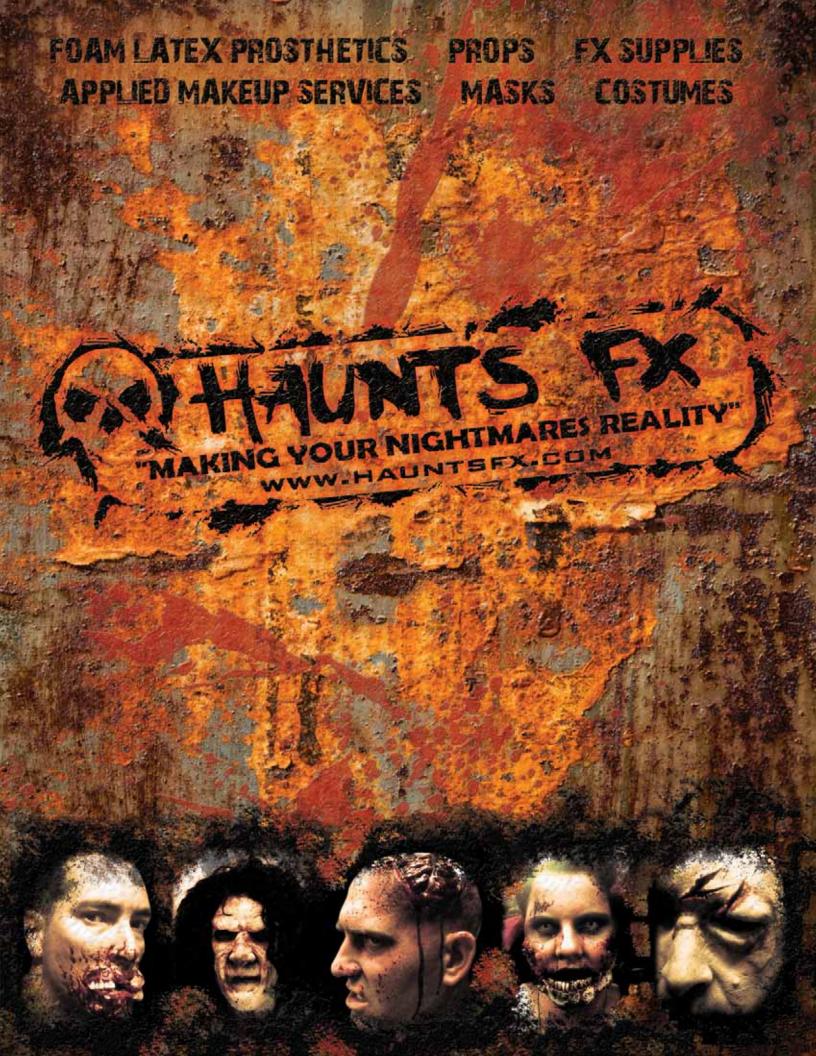
OFF SEASON EYENTS...

I also try to hold off season events to help keep the DA crew in touch. This is usually a movie night at the haunt or a local event which would include a performance from one of the crew. We have many very talented musicians, comics, artists etc. Last year we held The Devil's Double Feature every month which was a movie night with 2 horror movies. We will do this again in 2014 but less frequent and will be at the haunt itself.

As for community events we like to give back when the opportunity presents itself. In 2013 we participated in several events. We worked with one of the local high schools and Police Department to provide make up for several actors for a reenactment of a car accident due to drunk driving. It was a very impactful experience which hopefully prevented drinking and driving among the high school students (500+ were in attendance). We also teamed up with another haunt (Grim Trails) and put together a one day haunted house for Camp Quality (a camp for very sick children). This was an

awesome experience to work together with another haunt and provide many children with a one of a kind Halloween celebration. It was also a challenge to build and tear down an entire haunt all in one day! Other events that we also participated in where: The Zombie Run (we provided make up for 200+ zombies) and we participated in the annual Louisville Zombie Walk (18,000+ zombies terrorizing the city of Louisville). We also support many podcasts on and off season with interviews from many of our characters. Hauntcast, Return of the Living Podcast, Scary Noises and Black Listed Comedy are just a few and if you haven't checked them out please make sure to!

As for other days to open off season I have not found (in speaking with other haunt owners) them to be a good financial decision. Unless there is a haunt related convention, such as Hauntcon, we are strictly open during the haunt season (Sept. and Oct.). If there ever does become a huge demand from our customers to open another time of the year (ie. Bloody Valentines Day, A Krampus Christmas) then it would definitely be a considered.

Manormortis is the third permanent scare attraction designed and built by the company (Sunken Village of the Damned in Cornwall and The House of Fear in Greece, being the first two), a fourth, named 'Labirinto' is due to open in Portugal in early 2014.

The attraction is a 4800 square foot classic 'haunted house' style attrac-

tion which combines European scare entertainment storytelling with classic American style impact scares across 24 themed rooms and environments.

The Imagineering and design phase for Manormortis was an 18 month journey for the production team who immersed themselves in classic ghost stories, movies and legends. Mark Lofthouse, Director of Imagineering for AtmosFEAR! Scare Entertainment, said 'we looked at films like 'The Haunting', 'Steven King's Rose Red', 'Crooked House' and 'The Legend of Hell House', plus the various ghost stories of James Herbert, M. R. James, and Susan Hill's 'The Woman in Black' before we decided on the theme of the attraction. Other reference seeds included classic British ghost stories like the allegedly true 'Monster of Glamis Castle', the American 'Winchester Mystery House' and the stories of the 'UK's most haunted house' Borley Rectory in Essex. We also looked at existing scare attractions which present the classic 'haunted house' theme like Gasten Ghost Hotel in Sweden and Legendary Truth in America.'

Designed as a set of four 'quads' the attraction includes a labyrinth of back-stage corridors and 'rat runs' which allow quick movement by scareactors behind the scenes. The physical set is like a huge piece of Swiss cheese with 'impact hatches' in chests of drawers, cupboards, behind curtains and through walls. These give scareactors the theoretical 'scare-portunity' to target guests a total of 73 times as they navigate through the labyrinthine warren of passageways and chambers. The design also allows for easy changes to the guest navigation as the house 'changes shape' in line with its deepback-story.

The attraction is presented in a variety of time-periods, from the medieval Kitchen to the more lavish Edwardian Great Hall and Victorian Conservatory, each featuring authentic set dressing. Jason Karl, Chief Creative Executive for AtmosFEAR! Scare Entertainment said 'authenticity was key during the design and realisation phases. We spent months sourcing hundreds of pieces of antique furniture and props to ensure that the environments would look and feel believable. We bought an entire library of old books and sourced authentic artefacts connected with the supernatural for The Museum of the Strange room.

The fictional history behind Manormortis is as elaborate as its set design, and will form the majority of content in a brand new experiential website which is due to launch in early 2014. Website visitors will be able to learn about the houses past, the inhabitants who have lived (and died) there, and explore the environments through video and photography.

The attraction's back story presents the house as a 'living, breathing entity' or 'Domus Mactabilis' -in simple terms it feeds on those that dare to enter and grows in size as it devours them. This means that the environments will continually change and shift, giving repeat guests a new experience every time. The characters that inhabit the house are also fluid - and can be plucked from any part of the attractions fictional historical timeline. The flexibility of the design means that imagineers have the opportunity to introduce new rooms and change the layout frequently. A 3 storey 'Bell Tower' is planned for 2014 along with a 'shiver chute' and new characters including the evocatively titled 'Meat Man'.

Technically, the attraction utilises over 100 DMX controlled lights, operated via a central computer which also runs the scent pods, haze machines and other effects including digital ghost projections, a Claustrophobia corridor and a 'Living Painting' which comes to life and speaks directly to the guests. Imagineers used scare attraction online technology tool 'Haunt Design Kit' to plan and pre-visualise the attraction layout.

The primary orchestral score for the attraction was written by Chris Thomas, an LA based award-winning film composer, whose haunting track will also be featured on the attraction's dedicated website.

Manormortis first opened its doors as the headline attraction at Scare Kingdom Scream Park this Halloween (2013) and will be open at various times of the year, presented in different ways. On Friday 13th December it re-opens as 'Christmas FestEVIL' which is inspired by the little-known English ghoststory 'The Mistletoe Bough', and in 2014 will offer a family-friendly scare experience as 'Mystery Mansion'. The park operators are also planning to make the attraction available for wedding parties, private functions and film/television production

Overnight stays are also planned for those brave enough to spend the night inside a scare attraction as 'Hotel Manormortis' offers the chance to dine in 'The Devil's Dining Room', take part in a séance in the Library and sleep in the Grand Bed Chamber.





MODO MILE

These Voodoo Doll props can be made very quickly and very cheaply. Head out to your local dollar store and pick up a package of Spanish moss and a roll of string:





MATERIALS

Strips of cloth, I cut my cloth from an old yellow pillow case. You can tea stain them for an even older look. The strips were roughly 3 inches wide, but it really doesn't matter how wide your strips of fabric are. I used four strips.

Two sticks from a fallen tree branch, one a little shorter than the other. Again size doesn't really matter but mine are roughly 12 inches and 9 inches long.

A sharpie marker

Hot glue gun

STEP ONE - THE CROSS

Form a cross with your sticks. I eyeballed it, moving the smaller stick up and own the longer one until I thought it looked right. Place a dab of hot glue where you want the sticks to intersect



and set your smaller stick in place.
Place a dab of glue on the back side of the cross and carefully stick the end of your string in the glue:



Wrap the string diagonally around the two sticks, keeping it as tight as possible. I wrapped four times in one direction, then four times in the other direction creating an X with the string:



It doesn't really matter so many times you wrap the string in each direction as long as the sticks are firmly tied together. When you are satisfied with the wrapping, add another dab of hot glue over the string the secure it all in place:



STEP TWO - STUFFING:

I recommend using a drop cloth of some sort as this part gets messy. Run a bead of hot glue along your sticks:



Then place Spanish Moss into the hot glue, adding as much as you like. I used half a bag for this one:



STEP THREE - DRESSING IT UP:

Start at the bottom of you doll and wrap a length of your cloth around the "foot" leaving room for the Spanish moss stuffing to hang out. Use a dab of hot glue to hold the cloth together:



Continue to wrap the cloth around the doll, overlapping the cloth with each turn. When you get to the center of the cross, wrap it diagonally across the center as you did with the string, forming an X:







For the head, try to keep the cloth open as opposed to wrinkled or twisted:



Cut the cloth so the end will be at the back of the head. Run a bead of glue along the end of the cloth:



Carefully press it together to form the head of the doll:





Repeat this same process to cover the arms. You should something that looks like this:



STEP FOUR - BINGING:

This step will bind it all together. It adds another layer of detail to the doll and also allows you to form it to your own liking.. You can use a different color string or yarn for this to add interest, but for now we will just use the same string we used to tie the sticks together.

Start by tying the string around the neck:



Then wrap the string around the doll as you did with the cloth. I wrapped a few times around the neck, then criss-crossed the chest area, wrapped down the length of one arm, back to the center, then down the other arm, back to the center again, and finally down the body to the feet area. When you get to the feet area, apply another dab of hot glue to bind the string and cloth together. This is what I ended up with:



STEP FIVE - GIVING IT CHARACTER

Here you can personalize your dolls in any way you choose to fit your haunt theme or haunt



characters. Take a sharple and freehand a face onto your doll. Here's is what I did:

Your doll is essentially finished at this point. You can adorn it however you see fit. Lightly mist it with black and/or other color spray paints to add age, mold, etc. Use colored string, yarn, or cord on top of, or instead of, the cloth. Use different colored paints or markers to draw clothing, symbols, or other things onto your doll. Add "hair" with colored yarn, string, even feathers.

It is a well-known fact and commonly used phrase that "history repeats itself." In some cases, this can be a useful occurrence. Many seem to disagree when it comes to a piece of art (whether the medium is movies, television or music) that they have held near and dear to their hearts for years and in most cases, decades.

Many movies over the duration of the past thirty years such as; Scarface, Cape Fear, Straw Dogs and several others are actually remakes, but the latter versions are commonly known as the originals to the audiences from the eighties to recent times that viewed them upon their releases. Scarface is now in production for a second remake. The fans of these films either don't see them as remakes, or welcome them with open arms. The eighties comedy, Overboard (originally starring Kurt Russell and Goldie Hawn) is also scheduled for a modern run in two-thousand and fourteen, along with the eighties action classics, Wargames (starring Allie Sheedy and Matthew Broderick) and Escape From New York (starring Kurt Russell).

The aforementioned genres had a big following in the eighties, but the Horror genre has very avid fans with dedication that is not present in any other genre. Horror conventions are held all year around, and all around the world. Horror fans are the most hardcore followers of their beloved macabre set pieces and blood and guts.

There has been a slew of Horror remakes since the seventies and earlier, and the trend chain does not seem like it will break any time soon. To many fans of the Horror genre, this is a blasphemous slap in the face with a brick to the classics that have held up on their own over the years.

In most instances, reboots are a one-time round (some may include sequels). In other situations, the tiring retreading of a film or its loosely based subject matter may seem like overkill in the eyes of many. Wes Craven's debut, The Last House on the Left, was a loosely based remake of the nineteen-sixty Ingmar Bergman film, The Virgin Spring. Since The Last House on the Left, there has been an official remake with the same title. Prior to that, there was Chaos. This film was originally planned to be a Last House on the Left remake (the similarities are very abundant throughout the film).

With the massive "outbreak" of zombie culture on the

rise, films like George Romero's *Dawn of the Dead* and *Day of the Dead* have been reimagined as well. These two came long after Tom Savini's remake of George's original black and white introduction to "the walking dead," *Night of the Living Dead*. Some fans of the genre believe the zombie franchise is being driven into the grave by the mass production of books, remakes, (even) originals and a television series.

Americanizing foreign films has also become very popular in the last few years. Movies such as; Let the Right One In (American title: Let Me In), Ju-On (American title: The Grudge), Ringu (American title: The Ring), Funny Games, Oldboy, Dark Water, The Eye, Pulse, Shutter, Mirrors, The Vanishing, The Echo, One Missed Call and The Uninvited among others have made their way to The United States in an Americanized rebirth. Some believe that the reason for this trend is the superior quality of foreign to American Horror.

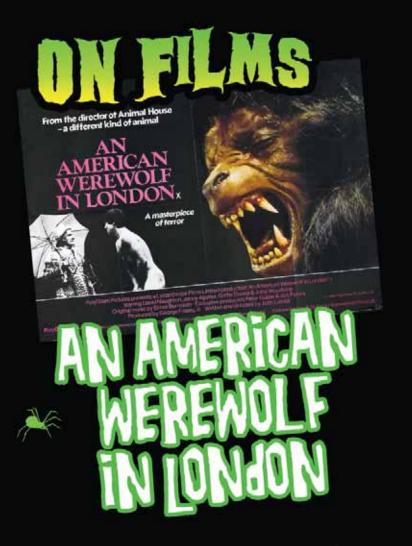
There are a few Writers that, on a rare occasion, decide to remake their own movie. Some do it because they were not happy with one aspect or the other of their original vision. They may have not been happy with the acting, production or even their own direction. Michael Haneke remade his own film, Funny Games, in an American version to represent it with better Actors. Donald P. Borchers, remade Children of the Corn. He was the producer of the original, and remake. He wanted the second adaptation to stick more to the story than the original film version. He claimed that the Hollywood overlords demanded a happy ending in the 1984 version. He wanted the new adaptation to end on the down note in sequence with Stephen King's original story, as well as Burt and Vicky's distaste for each other (which was lacking in the original film). Wes Craven was also considered remaking his classic, Shocker, for newer audiences that missed Horace Pinker's electrifying original debut.

Some also classify new adaptations of novels as, "remakes," in the celluloid medium. This, technically, is not true. Films such as; Willy Wonka (Charlie) and the Chocolate Factory, Children of the Corn, The Dead Zone, The Shining, Carrie, IT, Psycho, American Psycho, Silent Night, Deadly Night (originally titled, Slayride), The Legend of Sleepy Hollow and several others originally appeared in the written and bound format long before they were reinvented as movies for the big screen. Another version of the book in movie form is simply a second adaptation of the novel. The new version of American Psycho (based on the novel by Bret Easton Ellis) that is slated for release in 2014 promises to stick closer to the book than the watered-down first adaptation, released in 2000. Many fans of the novel believe that an adaptation that completely stuck to the writer's vision would have to be released unrated or rated NC-17 due to its extremely graphic nature.

One thing is certain... Remakes (or "Reboots," as they are commonly called) and even new adaptations of novels stir controversy on both sides of the movie-going audience. Some love them, some hate them...and some love to hate them. Rob Zombie's Halloween, for instance, has strong opinions on both sides. His long-time, diehard fans praise it, and the hardcore John Carpenter fans despise it (especially the sequel). The remake of *The Last House On the Left* is strongly disliked by most fans of the original, yet those introduced to the film by the new version seem to think it's okay. *The Friday the 13th , The Amityville Horror, The Texas Chainsaw Massacre and A Nightmare On Elm Street* remakes have their groups of fans but most of the Horror seeking masses prefer the originals. Some even see Michael Bay as the reincarnating devil of the movie industry.

While the above mentioned seem to have a split opinionated fan base, others such as the I Spit On Your Grave remake, seem to accumulate a following from new fans, and lovers of the original 1978 version as well. In the long run and overall, it's up to you; the viewer, renter, collector and movie-going audience, to decide for which side you're rooting. Are remakes acceptable...or the new trending stamp of unoriginality?

Then I thought about the movie 'An American Werewolf in London', and the impact it had on me back in 1981, and how affected I was by the transformation of the werewolf onscreen. No small accomplishment for a below-the-line member of a movie staff. Failure to give him credit for the successes of the films he has participated in would be like saying Babe Ruth was a decent right fielder for the Yankees. It's an accurate enough statement, but doesn't begin to describe his contributions to the game.

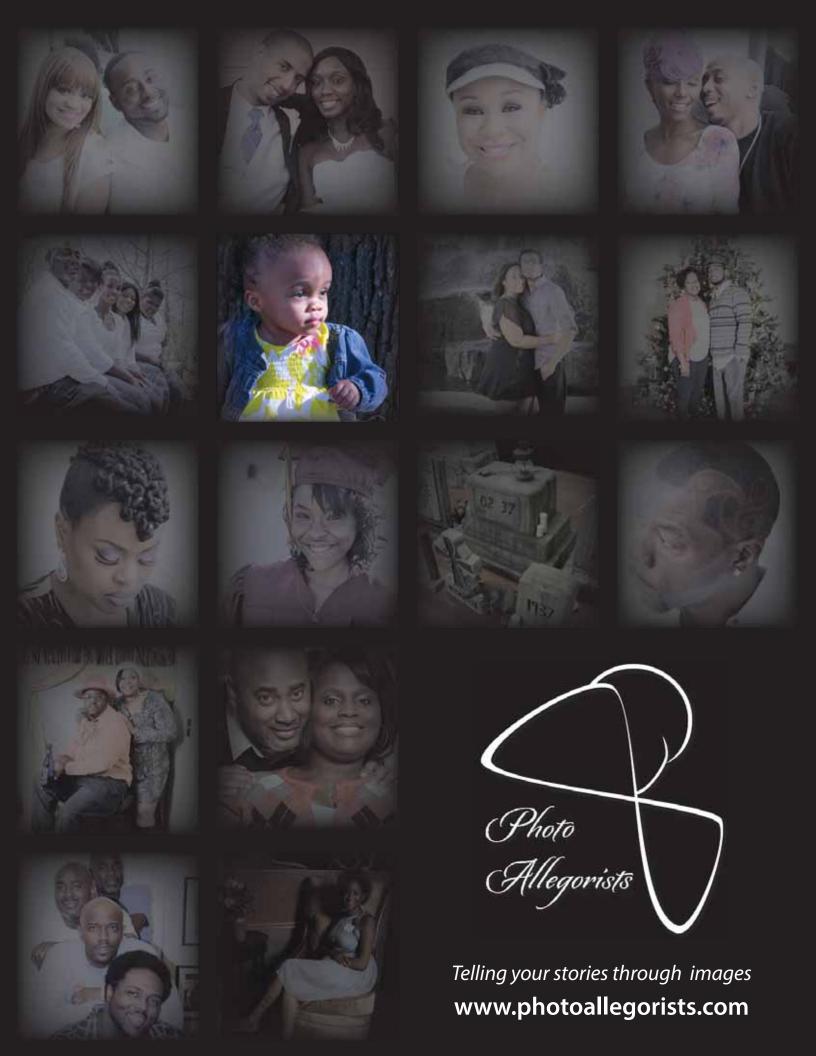
Dick Smith is known as the 'Godfather of makeup' in the industry, and Rick's first professional job was serving as his protégé on the film 'The Exorcist'. Dick was the driving force behind turning Lon Chaney into a scaled mutant in the 1959 sci-fi flick 'The Alligator People', De Niro's mo-hawk in 'Taxi Driver', Brando's look in 'The Godfather' parts 1 & 2, and the list goes on. Rick Baker is the Dick Smith of the modern era; the type of make-up artist that can create looks that change a movie's relevance in terms of its place in history. The transformation of David Naughton's character, David Kessler, into the werewolf creature in 'An American Werewolf in London' still holds up as well today as it did in the eighties. That film was one of Michael Jackson's favorites, and as a result Jackson got John Landis and Rick Baker to participate in his 'Thriller' video along with Vincent Price; aside from MTV coming on-air, that world premiere of that

video was the cable channel's other

greatest moment. Despite the revolutionary changes in the world of movie effects like CGI, the afore-mentioned movie and video still look better than some modern-era makeup effects. The absolutely disgusting piece of skin dangling from Griffin Dunne's upper throat in 'Werewolf in London' was just an unplanned little tidbit bit of twisted magic. I can still recall the effects of

the movie being discussed at school for days after it was released. And as for what the 'Thriller' video represented to that generation, words can't describe.

Rick's current project is the Disney release of 'Maleficent' starring Angelina Jolie (it hits theaters late spring/early summer). It's the tale of 'Sleeping Beauty' as told by the evil titular princess. Luckily I have a six-year-old to serve as a built in excuse for a forty-something year male to be in the theater for that one. Even if you don't, I encourage you to go see the master ply his trade when this flick hits the Cineplex this summer. In today's fantastic world of CGI, we are losing our opportunities to see artists who work in the organic medium. Rick Baker is the best of our generation in the world of makeup, (only Dick Smith and Stan Winston can be argued as better or equal). When it's said and done, he'll be on the short list of the best ever. We're extremely lucky to get to see his work when it's brand new to the eyes of the public, folks. For me personally, I can't wait. Rick Baker IS the magic of his movies. Hope to see you there.







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
